HOMECOMING Melanie B. Coddington

This Sunday's first reading contains some of the last words of Isaiah. Starting a few verses ahead of today's passage, we discover that those who defiled the land by the worship of false gods will perish. Then the Lord will call the neighboring nations to see his glory, and from among them will send forth messengers "to the distant coastlands," bearing the word of his mighty deeds. Finally, the remnant of Israel, Jews in exile scattered among all the nations will hear the call home and return to Jerusalem by every possible means of transportation, including horses, chariots, carts, mules, and dromedaries.

To sum up: Insiders will be cast out, outsiders invited in, and the lost welcomed home. This full-scale reversal of fortune links directly to the Gospel reading: "And people will come from the east and the west and from the north and the south and will recline at table in the kingdom of God. For behold, some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last."

Psalm 117 follows the first reading, appearing in its entirety. Just two verses long, it is the briefest of the psalms but among the most inclusive and broad in its scope. Here, the national borders of Israel give way, as Psalm 117 invites all nations to join in the praise of the Lord God.

Though this tiny poem may have once served as the beginning of Psalm 118, or as the conclusion of Psalm 116; at some point it claimed its grand independence. St. Paul quotes it in support of his equally grand mission to the Gentiles in Romans 15:11.

The refrain, taken from Mark 16:15, provides emphatic marching orders, "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News." Verse 1 calls upon all nations to praise and glorify God, while the verse 2 supplies the reason for this universal praise: "For steadfast is his kindness toward us, and the fidelity of the Lord endures forever."

The kindness and enduring fidelity of God, that we experience through Jesus Christ, by the power of the Spirit, make possible our entry "through the narrow gate." Human striving will fail us, but Christ has offered himself as the way, the truth, and the life that leads to the Father. We "strive" (by the Spirit) to remain open to the grace (of the Spirit) that draws us home to God.
