# FANNING THE FLAME Melanie B. Coddington

Every now and then, the Lectionary readings seem to sound forth across the gulf of time and space and speak directly to our age and our situation. Listen to a line from today's reading from the Book of the Prophet Habakkuk: "Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and clamorous discord." This is a rough time in our world, in our nation, and in our church, with plenty of strife and clamor. The Lord's answer to Habakkuk seeks to calm the prophet and us along with him: "...the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment; and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late." In the final line of today's reading, we hear the key word: "...the just one, because of his faith, shall live." Times like this call for a renewal of faith. Otherwise, we cannot help but loose heart in the din of doom.

St. Paul says, "...stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-

control." (The last word circles back to Habakkuk, where we hear about "the rash one.") It seems that fear and recklessness have troubled our people through the generations, and St. Paul's antidote—living faith in Christ—still applies.

In today's Gospel, Jesus responds to the apostles' demand, "Increase our faith," with a reference to the mustard seed. According to Jesus, just a small kernel of real faith can do great things. What is it about the tiny seed that points to faith? It does nothing on its own, but relies entirely on earth, sun and rain, gifts of the Creator, for its growth and flourishing. Likewise, real faith trusts, relying entirely on God and not on our own efforts.

In his very first encyclical letter, Lumen Fidei, The Light of Faith, Pope Francis weighed in on the subject. He spoke not of beliefs, tenets, or codes, but of relationship, saying, "Faith is born of an encounter with the living God who calls us and reveals his love, a love which precedes us and upon which we can lean for security and for building our lives. Transformed by this love, we gain fresh vision, new eyes to see; we realize that it contains a great promise of fulfillment, and that a vision of the future opens before us." We hear in the Pope's words an echo of the Lord's reassurance to Habakkuk: "...the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment; and will not disappoint."

The Holy Father built on this theme of faith rooted in relationship in Evangelii Gaudium, The Joy of the Gospel, saying, "I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day....The Lord does not disappoint those who take this risk; whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms."

Some of us Catholics may still feel a bit skittish about this language of personal relationship with Jesus. Certainly, we believe in God as a Trinity of persons; so perhaps we can talk about faith as relationship with God, through Jesus Christ, by the power of the Holy Spirit. This relational faith rightly seeks the grace of the sacraments, the guidance of scripture and tradition, and the support of community to fulfill the mission handed on by Jesus: to proclaim the Good News of God's love and mercy to all the world.

How do we fan the flames of faith? We don't; the Holy Spirit does. We need only open the door and let the divine draft "stir into flame" the gift already given.
