Attention Ladies of the Spirit of the Mountain Cluster: In case you missed this information here

is a repeat for all the ladies of our cluster: Our Cluster has been contacted by a parishioner from Father Emmanuel's former parish to let us know of a program that asks for special prayers for our priest. The program is called the Seven Sisters Apostolate. The Seven Sisters Apostolate is a call to strengthen the Church by ensuring that a Holy Hour is preyed each day of the week for the sole intention of a specific priest. We are asking for our ladies to step up to this call to pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament for one hour on one day of the week (each lady would choose one day per week to pray or to be a substitute in case someone cannot do their prayers in front of the Blessed Sacrament) for the sole intention of our priest. We need a minimum of 7 ladies to commit so that each day of the week would be covered for one hour. BUT we also need substitutes who could pray on days when the original lady may not be able to get to the Church. Of course, ladies may pray at any Catholic Church with the Blessed Sacrament there. So, if someone is traveling, the prayers can be offered for the priest at a Catholic Church that one may find on the road. Please pray for guidance as each lady answers the call to prayer for our priest. Remember without a priest, there is NO Eucharist! If you can commit to this prayerful support of our priest, please text Donna Bates at 276-337-8279. Thank you! Four ladies have volunteered—we only need three more. We can always use more as substitutes but three is what we need right now to get this underway.

Theme: The Eucharist as the source of eternal life.

In the first reading from the Book of Proverbs (9:1-6), we see Wisdom personified as a woman who prepares a feast and invites the simple and those lacking understanding to come and eat her bread and drink her wine. This imagery reminds us that wisdom is not just about knowledge but about a deep, lived understanding that guides us towards righteousness and life. The invitation to "come, eat of my bread and drink of the wine I have mixed" points us towards a higher spiritual nourishment that only God can provide.

Our Gospel reading from John (6:51-58) directly connects to this theme as Jesus presents Himself as the "living bread that came down from heaven." He invites us to eat His flesh and drink His blood, promising that those who do will have eternal life. This is one of the most profound and mysterious teachings in Christianity, as Jesus identifies Himself with the bread and wine of the Eucharist. He is not offering mere physical sustenance but a spiritual one that leads to eternal life.

For many, this teaching was difficult to accept, just as it can be challenging for us today. It calls for faith that transcends our understanding, a faith that believes in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It challenges us to look beyond the physical and material and recognize the spiritual nourishment that Christ offers us daily in the Eucharist.

In the context of the liturgy and our lives, these readings challenge us to reflect on our approach to the Eucharist. Do we approach it with the reverence and understanding that it is the true body and blood of Christ, the source of eternal life? Do we allow this divine wisdom to transform our lives, guiding our actions and decisions?

This Sunday is a call to deepen our faith and understanding of the Eucharist. It is an invitation to respond to Jesus' offer of eternal life, not just with our minds, but with our hearts and lives. Just as Wisdom invites the simple to her feast, Jesus invites us to His table to partake in the divine life. Let us respond with faith and a deeper commitment to live out the wisdom and life that He offers us.
