Father Emmanuel's Reflection for the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B

Theme: What truly holds us back from deepening our relationship with God.

In our Gospel reading from Mark, Jesus meets a man who, despite his wealth and status, is challenged to give up his possessions to follow Him. This narrative prompts us to reflect on what truly holds us back from deepening our relationship with God.

The rich young man approaches Jesus with eagerness, yet he leaves sorrowful, unable to part with his wealth. This moment illustrates the struggle many of us face, the difficulty of letting go of what we possess in order to embrace a more profound, spiritual richness.

In our first reading from the book of Wisdom, we are reminded that wisdom is more valuable than gold or silver. This serves as a powerful reminder that true fulfillment comes from seeking God and understanding His ways. It invites us to consider where we place our priorities and whether we are open to the transformative wisdom that God offers.

As we reflect on these readings, let's ask ourselves: What attachments do I need to examine in my life? Am I open to the divine wisdom that leads to true joy? How can I cultivate a spirit of gratitude for the blessings I have, rather than focusing on what I lack?

In a world that often equates success with material wealth, we are called to re-evaluate our values and recognize the richness of faith, love, and community. Let this Sunday inspire us to seek God's wisdom above all and to share the gifts we have received with others, fostering a spirit of gratitude and generosity.
