Reflection for the 3rd Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) Year C Theme: Rejoice

On this Third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, the Church invites us to rejoice as we draw closer to the celebration of Christ's birth. The rose-colored candle on the Advent wreath symbolizes this joy, reminding us that the Lord is near. The Gospel reading from Luke 3:10–18 captures this spirit of anticipation and excitement as John the Baptist continues his mission of preparing the way for the Messiah.

The people, moved by John's call to repentance, ask him, "What should we do?" John responds with practical advice rooted in justice, generosity, and integrity. To the crowd, he says, "Whoever has two cloaks should share with the person who has none, and whoever has food should do likewise." To tax collectors, he instructs them to collect only what is fair, and to soldiers, he demands they avoid extortion and abuse of power. These teachings highlight that true repentance is not just about turning away from sin but also about actively living out our faith in love and service to others.

John's message remains relevant today. As we prepare to welcome Christ into our hearts, we too must ask, "What should we do?" Advent is a time to examine our lives and align our actions with God's will. Are we generous with what we have? Are we fair and just in our dealings with others? Are we witnesses of God's love in the way we treat those around us?

In this Gospel, John also shifts the focus from himself to the One who is to come, saying, "One mightier than I is coming. I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals." His humility and joyful expectation point us toward Jesus, who will baptize us with the Holy Spirit and fire. This baptism is not just a cleansing but a transformation, igniting within us the light of God's love and purifying our hearts so that we can reflect His glory.

Gaudete Sunday reminds us that joy is not dependent on external circumstances. It is rooted in the knowledge that God is with us. Even amidst life's challenges, we can rejoice because Christ's presence brings hope, peace, and renewal. As we light the rose-colored candle, let it symbolize our trust in God's promises and our commitment to live as bearers of His joy in the world.

In these final weeks of Advent, let us open our hearts to the transformative grace of God. Let us share what we have, act with integrity, and prepare the <u>way</u> for the Lord by living lives of love and compassion. As we draw closer to Christmas, may we rejoice in the nearness of our Savior and embrace the joy that only He can bring.
