Reflection for 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

Theme: Blind leading the Blind

Have you ever caught yourself quickly pointing out someone else's flaws while ignoring your own? It is so easy to do that. Maybe it is a habit, maybe it is pride, or maybe it just feels easier to focus on what others need to change instead of looking inward. But in this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus challenges us to take a step back and examine our own hearts first.

He asks, "Can a blind person guide a blind person?" It is a simple but powerful image. How can we lead others if we are not seeing clearly ourselves? How often do we correct, criticize, or judge, without first allowing God to work on our own weaknesses? Jesus isn't saying we should ignore the faults of others, but He is reminding us that true wisdom and leadership start with self-awareness and humility.

Then He takes it even deeper: "From the fullness of the heart, the mouth speaks." That is a tough one because it means that what we say, whether in moments of frustration, gossip, or even sarcasm, comes from what is stored up inside us. If we are holding onto anger, resentment, or bitterness, it will eventually come out in our words and actions. But if our hearts are filled with love, patience, and kindness, that's what will overflow.

So maybe this week, instead of being quick to criticize, we can pause and ask: What is in my heart? What am I storing up inside? Am I filling my heart with God's love, or am I letting

negativity take root? Maybe it's time to invite God into those places that need healing. Maybe it's time to let go of the things that are making us bitter and start speaking words that bring life, not destruction.

Jesus is calling us to be people who bear good fruit, not just in what we do but in how we speak and treat one another. So let us ask Him to help us see clearly, to work on our own hearts first, and to make sure that what flows from us is something that truly reflects His love.

<u>St. Mary</u> – 4 PM - each Friday during Lent beginning March 7, 2025, Stations of the Cross will be recited followed by Mass.

<u>Good Shepherd</u> -- 6:00 PM – each Friday during Lent beginning March 7, 2025, Stations of the Cross will be recited followed by Mass.

Since we will be in Lent during the Friday Stations/Masses and the pillars of Lent are **Fasting**, **Praying and Almsgiving**, we need to make some sacrifices. It won't be compulsory, but for those who can and want to, the **collection basket** will be passed during these **Friday Lent Masses**.

Regulations for Fast and Abstinence During Lent

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted. Ash Wednesday, March 5 and Good Friday, April 18, are days of fast and abstinence.

ALL the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Welcome to the 2025 Annual Diocesan Appeal – Sharing His Love with Others.

Since the middle of January, you have been hearing about the 2025 Annual Diocesan Appeal: Sharing His Love with Others. This year's theme, Sharing His Love with Others, is such a great reminder of what the Lord calls us to do.

Your continued generosity to the Appeal and your faith in our ministries are proof that by offering the Lord what we can, He will provide what we need. It is with this in mind that I hope each of you will prayerfully consider supporting the 2025 Annual Diocesan Appeal. Our parishes are blessed because of the assistance of the Appeal. We have received Home Mission grants at St. Therese to put a new roof on the church building, replace the old heat pump; at St. Mary to add a parish hall/confessional and install a handicapped accessible bathroom; at Good Shepherd to renovate bathrooms in their community room and remove the steeple which was causing water damage in the church. Good Shepherd has also received from the Appeal funds Fuel and Hunger grants which have allowed them to respond to cluster requests for food and assistance with electric and water bills. In the middle of February, many of you received a letter from Bishop Knestout asking for your support of the 2025 Appeal. We hope you will prayerfully consider this request and some already have. For those of you who did not receive a mailing or have not had time to respond to it, we will conduct our In-Pew Process at all Masses during the weekends of March 8/9 and March 15/16. This will give you an opportunity to give your donation for the Appeal. Remember, half of what you give is returned to the parish.

This year we hope at St. Therese to raise funds to build up the checking account balances, at St. Mary build a retaining wall and do landscaping, and at Good Shepherd install leaf guards.


