Reflection for the 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, a moment filled with deep symbolism and meaning. In obedience to Jewish law, Mary and Joseph bring the infant Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to consecrate Him to the Lord. This act of devotion fulfills the Law of Moses, yet within this ordinary ritual, something extraordinary unfolds, the Messiah enters His Father's house for the first time

In the Temple, they encounter two faithful servants of God: Simeon and Anna. Simeon, a righteous and devout man, had been waiting for the "consolation of Israel." The Holy Spirit had revealed to him that he would not see death before witnessing the Christ. As soon as he sees Jesus, he takes the child in his arms and proclaims the beautiful canticle, the Nunc Dimittis:

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." (Luke 2:29-32)

These words are powerful. Simeon recognizes in Jesus the fulfillment of God's promise, not just for Israel, but for all people. He proclaims that Christ is the light of the world, a light that will shine on both Jews and Gentiles. Yet, he also foretells the suffering that will come, warning Mary that a "sword" will pierce her heart. This moment foreshadows Jesus' ultimate sacrifice on the cross and Mary's deep sorrow as His mother.

Then, we meet Anna, a prophetess who has spent decades in the Temple, fasting and praying. She too recognizes Jesus as the Redeemer and begins to praise God, speaking about Him to all who were awaiting the salvation of Israel. Her presence reminds us of the power of faithfulness and prayer. Even in old age, she remains watchful, and because of her perseverance, she is granted the grace of encountering Christ.

This feast is also known as Candlemas, emphasizing Jesus as the "light of revelation." It invites us to reflect on how we welcome Christ's light into our lives. Are we like Simeon and Anna, patiently waiting, praying, and remaining faithful, even when God's timing seems slow? Or do we allow darkness, doubt, fear, or complacency, to cloud our vision?

Simeon and Anna's response to Jesus is one of recognition, praise, and witness. They see Christ, rejoice in His presence, and share the good news. Their example challenges us: Do we truly recognize Christ in our daily lives? Do we praise God for His faithfulness? Do we share the light of Christ with others, especially in a world that often feels burdened by darkness?

Finally, we see in Mary and Joseph a model of humility, obedience, and trust. They present Jesus to God, acknowledging that He belongs to the Father. This act reminds us

that all we have, including our very lives, belongs to God. Are we willing to offer our lives to Him in trust, as they did?

As we celebrate this feast, may we open our hearts to Christ's light, embracing Him as our salvation. Like Simeon, may we long for and recognize His presence; like Anna, may we share His message with joy; and like Mary and Joseph, may we offer ourselves in faithful surrender to God's plan.
